What is Credit for Prior Learning?

Credit for Prior Learning (CPL) is college credit awarded for validated college-level skills and knowledge gained outside of a college classroom. Students' knowledge and skills might be gained through experiences such as:

- Military training
- Industry training and certification
- State/federal government training
- Volunteer and civic activities
- Apprenticeships, internships, work-based learning, or other industry-based experiential learning

"Credit for Prior Learning: Leveraging Past Learning to Close Present-Day Equity Gaps"

- Most Californians who could benefit from CPL are people of color
- Validates learning that has occurred
- Reduces unit accumulation
- Increases time to completion
- Aligns with Guided Pathways/VFS



CPL Course Crosswalk/Inventory Sheet

- An effective tool for faculty to assess which courses are CPL eligible within their discipline, best methods of assessment, part of a transfer degree, etc.
- This inventory sheet can be used to create a college CPL database
- The first step to helping students find CPL eligible courses

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Business Example

Palomar currently has 12 disciplines with 80+ CPL eligible courses.

Palomar Faculty Champions are leading the way to help students earn credit for prior learning.

Using Canvas for Portfolios & Credit by Exam

At Palomar College, two or more faculty within a discipline collaborate using a template to develop a rubric that ensures a fair and equitable assessment of CPL for all students within their discipline (this rubric template will be in the “CPL Toolkit”)

Courses assessed by Portfolio Review and/or Credit by Exam have their own “sections” in Canvas

Students upload or complete their work in Canvas and then faculty assess the work and enter the final grade into the Student Information System

The coursework is then archived in Canvas



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

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These credit recommendations appear on the service member's **Joint Services Transcript (JST)**.

At Palomar College, we modified our existing “Credit by Exam” policy to create our “Credit for Prior Learning” policy. At Norco College we have three district colleges collaborating on this.

Some tips to help you get started...

- Download and review the AP and BP policies from the [Palomar College CPL website](#)
- Modify the policies to fit your college’s needs
- Reach out to your Faculty Senate/District Presidents to get on the agenda early in the semester to inform your fellow faculty on CPL and the new policies
- Determine what other stakeholders on your campus to include in the CPL discussion and policy approval process (Articulation, Student Services, Counseling, Records/Registrar, Administration, SLO coordinator, Governing Board, etc.)
- Inform these stakeholders and get their input
- Learn your college’s policy approval process to stay informed of important meeting dates, approval deadlines, etc.

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

- ACE Military Guide can be difficult to navigate
- Created a platform to review and store articulations
- Used as a recruitment tool
- Expanding to all colleges within our district and throughout the 10 colleges of the IEDRC
- Goal to expand its use for all forms of CPL, not only military credit

Top 3 Actions Colleges can take To offer students CPL opportunities

1. Reach out to Faculty Champions to identify CPL eligible courses
 - a. Assessment Methods in place
 - b. Create an easy-to-access, updated database of CPL courses for faculty, counselors, students
2. Identify a CPL Counselor(s)
 - a. Familiar with the CPL policies and course offerings
 - b. Familiar with the internal CPL student petition process
 - c. Counsel students on CPL benefits and also current transfer challenges to the CSU/UC
3. Streamline the CPL internal process for students - make it easy!
 - a. Spread the word and identify potential students who can benefit from CPL
 - b. Create an electronic form to walk students through the CPL petition process from start to finish
 - c. Award the credit and transcribe the method of CPL assessment

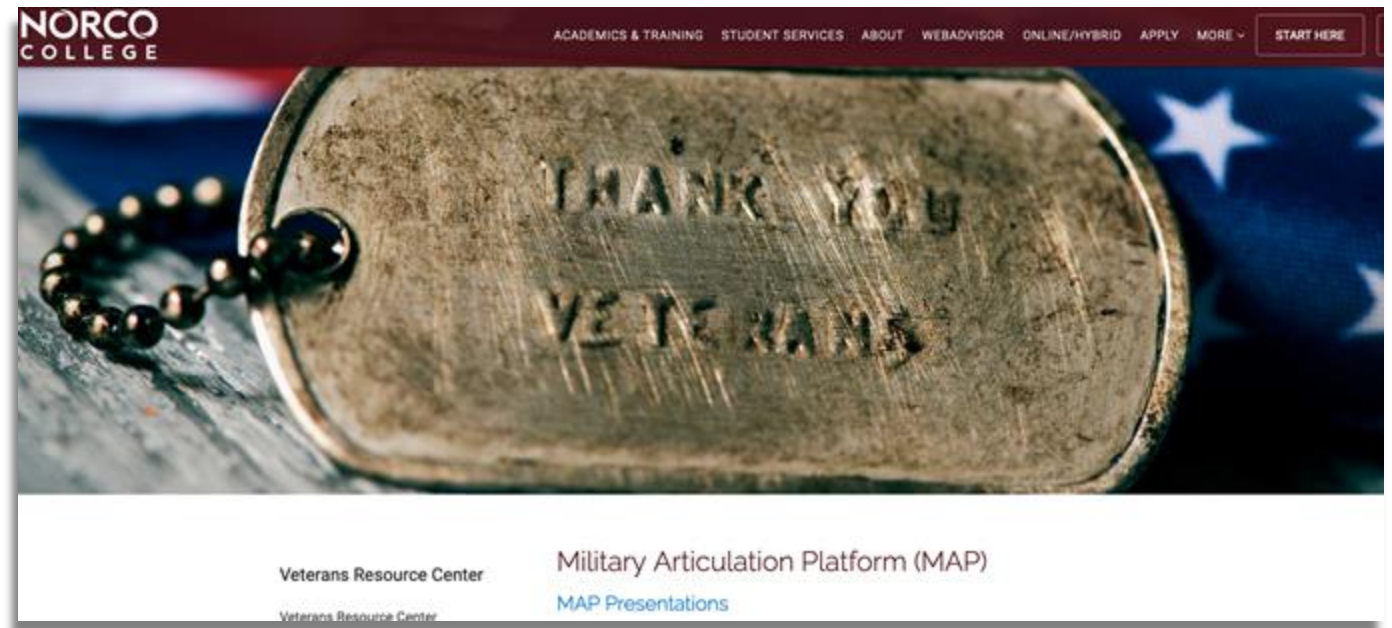

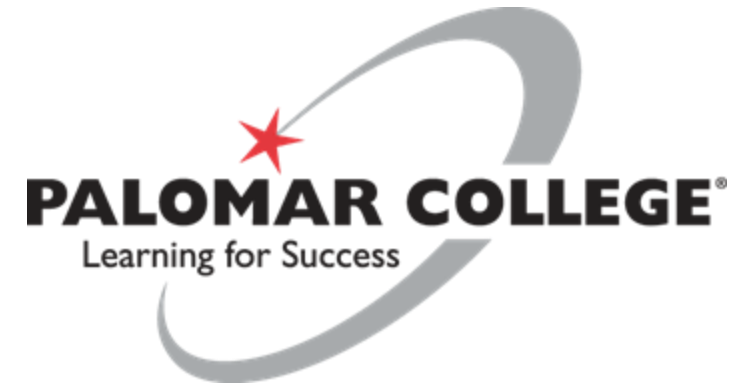

Goal: Change how we view CPL across campus

- Data about our students
- Interest from early adopters
 - CTE faculty
 - Veteran counselor is also CPL counselor
- New SCFF (i.e. completions)



1. Provides credit recommendations for all courses and occupations offered by all branches of the military.
2. Recommendations are conducted by college and university faculty members.
3. Reviews are based on content, scope, rigor and alignment of SLOs.
4. Recommendations must have 100% consensus from at least 3 faculty members so not all military occupations or courses have credit recommendations.
5. Military courses and occupations are reviewed every 10 years.

AWARDING MILITARY CREDITS- CPL Manual/General Process

1. Review JST
2. Determine Military Occupation or Course
3. Search for ACE recommendations
4. Compare ACE recommendations to college course
5. Allow faculty to review (the waiting game begins)
6. If approved, staff will update student records
7. Curriculum approval and then transcript

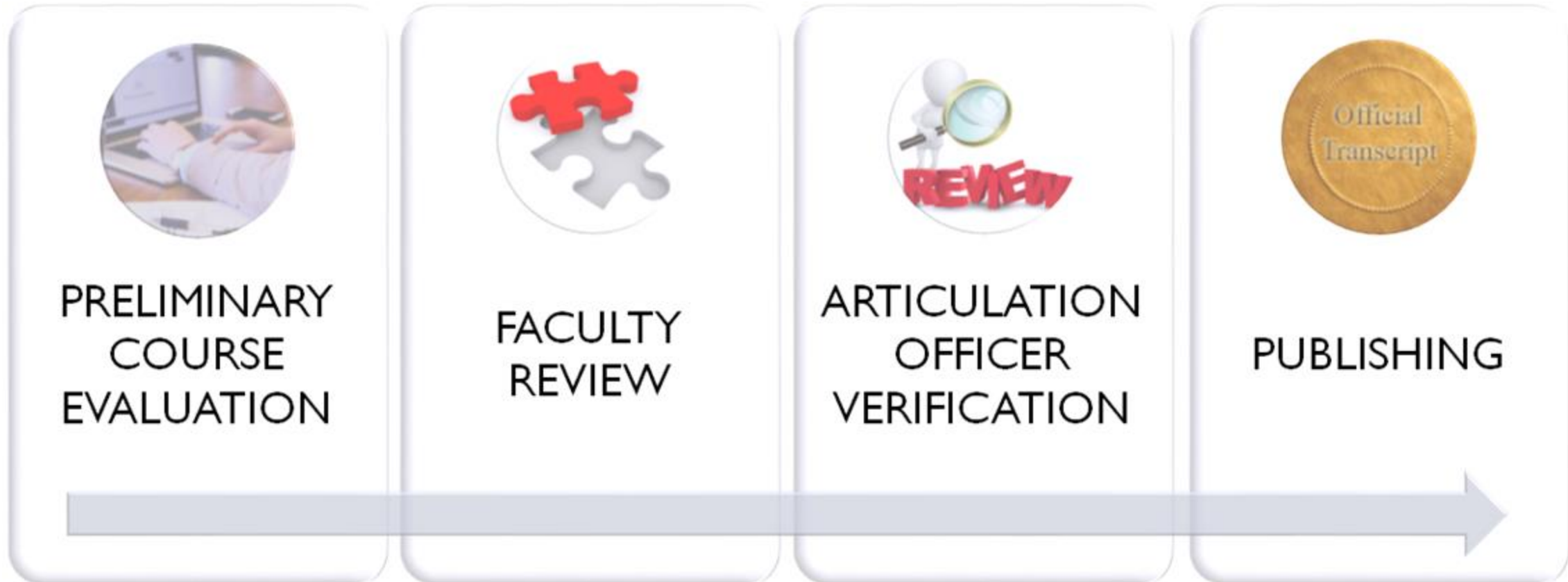
NORCO'S APPROACH

MILITARY ARTICULATION PLATFORM (MAP)

- Cloud-based system that connects colleges courses to ACE recommendations
- Delivers enhanced review process for faculty
- Stores all reviewed articulations (approved or denied)
- Integrated APIs that regularly updates course catalog and ACE information

Conducts investigations and supervises technical and other personnel in the investigation of known or suspected crimes involving government property and individuals subject to military jurisdiction; examines scene of incident and collects and submits all relevant physical evidence (fingerprints, blood stains, suspected narcotics, castings, documents) to crime laboratory; studies and evaluates evidence to determine motives and responsible individuals; develops investigative plans; prepares reports of investigations; apprehends violators or suspects based on probable cause; testifies at court-martial or other appropriate judiciary tribunals; engages in crime prevention efforts and physical security surveys; performs worldwide protective services for Department of Defense executives, visiting foreign officials, and other designated principals; applies techniques for effective investigation of any type of crime involving US government property and individuals subject to the Uniform Code of Military Justice; knows what constitutes an offense under applicable criminal codes and laws; applies techniques governing search and apprehension; applies rules of evidence and methods of collecting, preserving, and protecting evidence; applies complete procedures for identifying, protecting, and searching a crime scene; applies techniques of surveillance, covert operation, raids, and search and seizure and conducts such activities; applies evidence, records, and laboratory reports to criminal investigations; applies techniques of crime prevention, physical security, and industrial defense surveys; evaluates findings and develops recommendations resulting from such surveys; interviews and interrogates complainants, witnesses, informants, suspects, and other persons considered knowledgeable of or connected with crimes; develops information on suspects concerning habits, associates, aliases, characteristics, and other personnel information and uses such information in the investigative process; prepares proper records of information obtained through interviews and interrogations; supervises criminal investigation teams; applies basic techniques for conducting laboratory examinations and the analysis of physical evidence; evaluates all information obtained in connection with a specific crime; knows administrative procedures, report writing, correspondence formats, supply channels, and office management; testifies as expert witness concerning application of any standard technique or procedure used in criminal investigation; coordinates with appropriate civil and military agencies involving jurisdictional authority, exchange of information, and similar problems and considerations; may be an operations officer giving direction to other personnel involved in various investigations; may serve as an instructor or supervise instruction of personnel in various crime-related topics; may have foreign language proficiency; has extensive knowledge about narcotics and narcotics trafficking including identifying laboratories, drug traffic patterns, drug identification, and drug field testing; conducts drug abuse education programs.

The AVCOMM SYSTECH is responsible for the maintenance of entire communications system from the headset/microphone to the antenna.
